

## **Organizing Goals**

W.D. Hamilton first advanced his theory of inclusive fitness more than 50 years ago. This theory, formalized in "Hamilton's Rule," provided a key solution for one of Darwin's outstanding problems, the evolution of altruism, and spawned a virtual Cambrian Explosion in research in evolutionary biology and related fields. Theoreticians and empiricists throughout the world have spent five decades testing, hypothesizing about, and, in some cases, building entire fields of research based on, inclusive fitness. In addition, Hamilton's pioneering work on sexual reproduction helped launch decades of research that continues to flourish. The goal of our symposium is to evaluate the impact of Hamilton's work in science and society over the last half-century, and to explore its continuing influence in the next half-century and beyond.

We are fortunate to have a preeminent, interdisciplinary group of scientists, historians, and other thinkers gathering together to participate in this discussion. In order to provide a useful arc to the symposium sessions and allow ample time for discussion, we have organized the three-day symposium into sessions focused on the topics outlined below.

In addition, we are delighted that participants have agreed to provide a collection of essays on the subject in the style of a posthumous *Festschrift*. We are pleased that Professor Ullica Segerstrale, author of *Nature's Oracle: The Life and Work of W.D. Hamilton*, has agreed to serve as editor of this collection of essays.
